Image of the Month



Fascinating Fact



How deeply engrained is bird's territorial behavior? Recently I was out in the dry forest of northwestern Costa Rica (where I took the header image for this email) looking for a bird called the <u>Spotted Rail</u>. They live in dense grass and rice paddies. One way to attempt to get them out into the open is by playing their call and hoping they come near where you are playing the sound from.

However, another way to coax them out is by playing the sound of another bird they compete with. In this case we had success using the call of a <u>Blackish Rail</u>. Why is interesting? Because Blackish Rails don't exist in Costa Rica. They're only found in South America. But in South

America they exist in the same habitat and compete for resources. Their fighting spirit is ingrained in their DNA.

September 9th was Costa Rica's first ever Warbler Bird Count. The goal was to get people to go out and look for migratory warblers at a time when many of them are arriving or passing through the country. 26 species of warblers were reported, many of them migrants arriving for winter or passing through on their way to South America.
